



The Elements: Composition Guidelines and Suggested Considerations

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“The only rule in photography is that there are no rules”

In photography, there are no prescribed rules, but the guidelines provided here can guide you to better photography practices. Experimentation is key.



RULE OF THIRDS

- Think of the image as being divided into 9 sections made by 2 vertical and 2 horizontal lines. The rule of thirds says that the most important elements in your photo should run along these lines and/or at the points where the lines intersect.

Putting your subject off center adds interest, but you need other subject matter for balance.

SYMMETRY AND PATTERNS

Symmetry and Patterns are all around us in nature and in person-made constructions. Look for these to make eye-catching photos. It is fun to include something that adds tension.

LIGHT AND SHADOW

One of the most important considerations is light. It determines mood, atmosphere, texture, and vibrancy of colour.

What is the source of light? From what direction does it come? How does the light hit the subject?

Light from behind your camera gives a flat image and casts shadows behind the subject. Light from the side shows shape with more dramatic shadows. Light from behind the subject creates a halo and puts the subject in shadow.

Experimenting with light can create some interesting photos.

LEADING LINES



Our eyes are naturally drawn along lines, so the way we choose to include them in our photos requires thought. The lines pull the viewer through the scene.

PERSPECTIVE

Photographers consider a variety of angles from which a shot can be taken. Just as a story may have many versions, photographs can reveal different ways of seeing the same thing.

BACKGROUND

A busy background can be a diversion from the focus of a photo. Frame your shot in such a way as to eliminate as much distraction as possible.

DEPTH

Typically, photography is a two-dimensional medium. A photographer must keep this in mind and remember to be aware of foreground, middle ground, and background. An often used strategy is to layer objects/people within the photo so that the viewer's eye compensates for the perception of depth.

FRAMING

Nature and structures often provide desirable frames for an image. Utilizing these frames allows you to draw the viewer's eyes into the focal point.

CROPPING

Extraneous details are often distracting. Use the cropping tool to clean up the edges and lead the viewer to the subject of the photo.





PROJECT PLANNING

1. Since there is no final exam in this class, your marks are based on the completion of projects and a couple of theme-based quizzes. This requires effective planning and good product from you.
2. Your assignments will be posted in the following location:
MediaDrive/ClassAssignments/Photography/your grade level in course.
3. Since your teacher is new to the course (not teaching or technology or planning), assignments will be posted as they are prepared. You will be given sufficient time to complete each with the expectation that photography shots will be taken outside class time. See the course outline for the general layout of the course. Plan your time so you can be done early and/or have time to upgrade less satisfactory assignments in order to receive the best grade possible.
4. All photos must be originals, photographed by you, edited by you, and arranged by you for presentation. Any misrepresentation will result in a failing grade for that assignment.
5. Keep a journal documenting dates and locations when/where photos are taken. This must be handed in to indicate readiness for marking. Along with dates and locations, write notations about what technique you used and why you chose to use it. Record any personal, emotional, or logical response that will help your teacher understand your motivation. The journal can be in a book or written as a Word document, but diary-style entries must be made in full descriptive sentences. The student is responsible for keeping the diary intact as a body of evidence until all assignments are marked and shared with parents.
6. If you are unhappy with your posted mark, your teacher will likely permit you to upgrade and resubmit material once (perhaps twice, depending on effort). Respectful and reasonable requests will be considered.
